







$$= \begin{vmatrix} i & j & k \\ 3 & 1 & -2 \\ 1 & 2 & 3 \end{vmatrix}$$

$$\hat{i}(3 + 4) - \hat{j}(9 + 2) + \hat{k}(6 - 1)$$

$$\vec{\tau} = 7\hat{j} - 11\hat{j} + 5\hat{k}$$

$$|\vec{\tau}| = \sqrt{49 + 121 + 25} = \sqrt{195}$$

$$x = 195$$
